



Biographical/Historical Note

Physiologist, educator. Melvin J. Fregly was born in Patton, Pennsylvania, on May 26, 1925. He was educated in Patton public schools and graduated valedictorian of his 1943 class at Patton High School. Following graduation, he was inducted into the U.S. Army and served for the next three years in the Southeast Pacific Theater during World War II, including New Guinea, the Philippine Islands, and Japan.

<u>Donor Intent for Fund</u>: "Will be used for acquisitions and to support the biomedical collections in the Libraries, including the processing as a first priority of the Melvin J. and Marilyn S. Fregly Collection. It will also be used to promote education among students, faculty, scholars, and working professionals."

Purpose and goals of the Symposium

- O Topic: Promote new view of significant health concern- address social, cultural, and scientific issues raised by mosquito-borne illness, a subject that is vitally important to public health in the United States and Latin America.
- O Highly interdisciplinary: bring together experts in different fields to describe how each discipline addresses these problems, and promote discussion among participants as to how interdisciplinary collaboration can enhance the development of innovative solutions.
- O Promote outreach, collaborative transformation, and connection: across campus units and in the community.
- O Support broad library and archive functions: raise awareness of research, and promote awareness of library skills held by curators, liaisons, and archivists.
- Increase profile of and use of library materials: showcase science-based collections in the Smathers libraries, particularly the Fregly Collection.



- 3) problem solving of issues by discovering hidden resources.






- O Bringing together disparate groups generates creative interchanges

- Search for means to advertise and highlight archival collections
